For students who are receiving a placing in class (2nd or 3rd) or an endeavour award, these will be presented during the Prize Giving assembly on Thursday 31st October which will be held in the school hall at 10.00am. Service awards will also be presented during this assembly as well as the House Trophy. Parents, whānau and caregivers are welcome to attend this prize giving if they would like to.

STUDY LEAVE INFORMATION

Earlier this week, parents and caregivers of our Seniors were emailed home important information about Study Leave. The letters detailed as follows:

We are now heading towards the end of the timetabled school year for senior students. NCEA exams begin on Tuesday 5th November. See below a copy of the NCEA exam schedule (a downloadable pdf version can be fond on our website). Please note that morning exams begin at 9.30am and afternoon exams at 2.00pm. Students must bring their NCEA examination admission slip with them to the exam (these are being issued on Monday 21st October).

The purpose of this letter is to inform you about study leave for senior students. Study leave is given to students in Year 11, 12 and 13 to prepare for their upcoming examinations.

In 2024 ALL students in Year 11, 12 and 13 will be granted study leave from Monday 4th November.

From Monday 4th November, there will be additional catch up and support for those students who have not yet passed their NCEA Level. There will be a catch up week in A3 (the old library) with the senior hub team who will work with students on any outstanding assessments and learning that will help them towards achieving their NCEA Level from

9am through to 1.50pm every day. Teachers will also be available in their classrooms should students want to work with them directly.

I would encourage students who need this additional support to make the most of this catchup, it is amazing how much you can achieve in a week with the extra support.
