SCHOOL BASED IMMUNISATIONS

Public health nurses will be delivering two school-based immunisation programmes in your child's school during 2025

Year Seven Students-

These students will be offered the **Boostrix vaccine**, which is a booster for their early childhood immunisations of tetanus, diphtheria and pertussis (whooping cough). This is the same vaccination that would have been given to your child at age 4yrs if you consented.

Your child will be given a consent form to bring home for you to choose whether or not to have your child immunised by the Public Health Nurses at school.

- Information on the immunisations is included on the consent form which will be given to your child at the information session.
- Please complete the consent form and answer all the questions and return the form to school.

Year Eight Students -

These students will be offered the **Human Papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine**, this vaccine is given to help protect against cervical cancer and other HPV related cancers; the vaccination will be given in two doses within the year.

Information about the vaccination programme will be given to students at school and this session may include watching the Ministry of Health Presentation on Immunisations and is designed specifically for this age group.

- If your child is not being vaccinated at school please complete section B and return the form to school
- Please check with your doctor or <u>practice</u> nurse if you are unsure if your child has had a tetanus injection in the last two years.

For further information on these vaccines phone **0800 IMMUNE (466 863)**. If you change your mind at any time regarding immunisation, please contact the Public Health Nurse. If you have consented and your child is away on the day of vaccination, they will be offered a catch up within 4 weeks

- 1) SLIP: Clothing to cover as much skin as possible
- 2) SLOP: Sunscreen at least SPF 50 or SPF 50+ broad spectrum and water resistant
- 3) SLAP: Choose a broad-brimmed Hat. Caps and visors DO NOT provide enough protection
- SEEK: Find a shady spot, but STILL always use other protection methods eg sunscreen.
- SLIDE: Slide on some sunglasses. A Hat and Sunny's worn together can reduce UV radiation exposure to the eyes by up to 98%

STUDENT ABSENCES

We have several ways that you can let us know that your child/children will be absent from school.

If we have not heard from a caregiver by 10am then we will send a txt message and email to parents/caregivers. If you save the phone number/email address on this message it can be used for future absence notifications.

Please contact us every day that your child is absent unless you have told us in advance that they will be away for more than one day.

If your child has an appointment, please tell us what type of appointment it is e.g. Doctor, dentist etc as this affects the code we use.

	Links in this table are to core and optional topics. If any links are inactive, it means that topic doesn't apply to our school or that content is covered somewhere else.
Alcohol and drugs	Student Breaches of the Alcohol, Drugs, and Other Harmful Substances Policy – We use our student wellbeing and behaviour management policies to guide our response to possible and known student breaches.
Attendance	 Attendance Procedures – Parents/Caregivers are expected to notify the school as soon as possible if their child will be absent. The school follows up ongoing attendance issues.
Behaviour	 Behaviour Management – If you have concerns about an incident at school, please contact the school and the school will deal with the concern. Bullying and Harassment – Harassment and bullying behaviour by anyone is not tolerated at our school.

Cellphones and personal digital devices	 Cellphones – Our cellphones policy complies with government regulations and our approach to cellphones and other personal digital devices supports student engagement and achievement.
Closing the school (e.g. extreme weather, emergency)	School Closure – The school may need to be closed for a variety of reasons – we keep parents informed through our usual communication channels.
Concerns and complaints	 Raising Concerns and Complaints – Anyone who has a concern or complaint should raise it as soon as possible with an appropriate person at the school.
Contacting the school (communication)	 Communicating with Parents and Whānau – This policy outlines how the school and parents/whānau communicate and engage with each other.
Digital technology and online safety	 Digital Technology and Online Safety – This policy outlines the issues and challenges associated with our students being competent and confident users of digital technology, and focuses on the safety of students.

Emergency (communication)	 Communication During an Emergency, Disaster, or Crisis – In an emergency, disaster, or crisis the school contacts parents/caregivers/whānau when it can, using the emergency contact details provided, and releases information to the school community as appropriate.
Enrolment	Enrolment – This policy outlines our enrolment conditions and process.
EOTC (Education Outside the Classroom)	 EOTC Consent – This policy contains important information about parental consent, risk disclosure, and health information. EOTC Supervision – This policy contains information about volunteering for EOTC events.
Food and nutrition	Food and Nutrition – This policy outlines how we promote a healthy
	food and drink environment at school.
Getting to and from school safely	 Getting to and from School Safely – This policy outlines road safety at and around school, as well as travelling to and from school safely. If applicable, additional information (e.g. road patrol) is included here.
Healthcare	 Allergies - We aim to provide a safe environment for students with allergies. Parents advise the school of any allergies their child has, and provide an action plan as necessary. Asthma - Parents should inform the school, if their child has asthma, update this information as necessary, and provide the necessary medication. Communicating about Injuries and Illness - We follow school processes for contacting parents/caregivers or emergency contacts about injuries and illness. Infectious Diseases - Students must stay away from school when they are unwell to stop illness from spreading. How long they should be home depends on their illness. Remember to let the school know the student will be absent. Medicines - This policy explains how medicines are stored and administered.
Inclusive school culture	 Inclusive School Culture – We aim to create a safe and inclusive school culture where diversity is valued and all students and staff feel they belong.
Learning support	Learning Support – The policies in this section outline how we support student learning needs, and who provides this support.

BYOD IN 2025

This year, Waihi College has moved to a fully BYOD model. BYOD stands for Bring Your Own Device. Students and teachers are working more and more with digital platforms for the distribution and completion of work in the classroom. By students having their own device, there is a seamless link between home and in school learning and the student can personalise their device to suit their own needs.

Why BYOD?

Personalised, flexible learning • Increased access to devices for learning activities eg Google Drive, research, skills practice etc • Seamless learning between home and

school • 24/7 anywhere/anytime access to learning • Preparing for the future – IT/collaborative/ cloud-based tools.

What sort of device do I need?

For most students, the most economical device is a Chromebook. Ideally the device would have a minimum of 4GB RAM, a minimum of 32GB and a screen that is large enough for the student to read information on easily. All Chromebooks will have access to Google classrooms and the Google suite where the majority of work is completed in class.

For senior students (Year 12 and 13) who have specialised courses, they may choose to purchase a laptop that has higher specifications and the ability to add course related programmes. Noel Leeming, PB Tech, The Warehouse, Harvey Norman and JB Hi-Fi are some of the examples of retailers that offer excellent deals for devices.

Expectations

The device must be brought to school each day fully charged and is expected to have a minimum charge life of 6 hours. Students will be expected to use their own device in class and there will be no option for borrowing a device if a student fails to bring their device. The student will work on paper if they do not bring their device to school.

What if I am unable to purchase a device?

Waihi College will have devices available for students to lease should they be unable to purchase one themselves. Students will pay a bond to lease the device for the year, they will take the device home and use it as their own for the year. Parents/caregivers and students will sign a contract agreeing to maintain the condition and return of the device with any loss or damage charged to the student.

Lessons from Learning Support

What are Special Assessment Conditions (SAC)

Students with a permanent or long-term sensory, physical, medical or learning difficulty that directly impacts on their access to fair assessment for national qualifications may be eligible for Special Assessment Conditions, or SAC. SAC entitlements give students access to different types of support so they can complete internal and external NCEA assessments (exams). Some examples of SAC: special papers for vision-impaired students,writers or readers for students with learning disorders, such as dyslexia,rest breaks for students with diabetes, separate accommodation for students with anxiety disorder.

You can find more descriptions of what types of SAC are available here: SAC available:: NZQA Schools make submissions to NZQA for SAC on behalf of students. There is no charge for this process. Students give the school signed approval before the school sends the submission to NZQA. The school can gather information for evidence in a number of ways, including:the student's history of learning support provided at school. Comments and observations from teachers, the student and their parents or caregivers, medical or other reports provided by the student or their parents or caregivers, test results done by the school, for example, reading and writing tests, results of any trials of SAC.

Waihi College SAC Process

When your child is in Years 7 to 10 the school will be building a profile of any difficulties and how they are managing assessments. This profile helps build an informed application for SAC use for NCEA Level 1. It is important to raise any learning concerns that you may have for your child with the school as soon as possible and provide the school with copies of any medical or other reports that might help with the application. Through this process we identify students who are likely to be eligible for SAC. Students are then consulted and an application is lodged on their behalf. If the students application is successful students and teachers are notified and the students SAC entitlements are then immediately available to use for assessments . Applications are currently being processed and students should be informed within the next few weeks if they have SAC entitlements.
