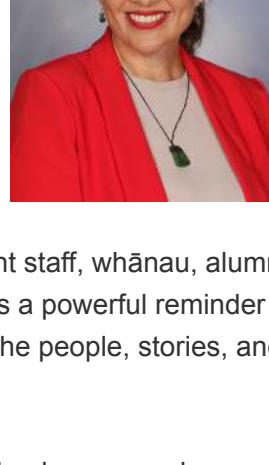

PRINCIPAL'S COMMENT

Tēnā koutou e te whānau o Waihi College, Nau mai, haere mai ki tēnei pānui o te kura — welcome to our latest school newsletter. It has been a truly special time for our kura as we continue to reflect on and celebrate 50 years of Waihi College.



Recently, we gathered with distinguished guests, past and present staff, whānau, alumni, and friends of the college to mark this significant milestone. It was a powerful reminder that milestones are not just about the passing of time, but about the people, stories, and shared journey that have shaped our kura.

Our history stretches back well beyond these 50 years — to 1901, when secondary education began in Waihi. Through challenges such as the 1931 fire, and the rebuilding that followed, education has remained a constant and valued part of our community. From the establishment of Waihi College as a full secondary school in 1954, to the move to our current site on Kensington Road, and the return of our Year 7 and 8 students in 1976, each chapter has strengthened the inclusive and connected kura we are today. Most importantly, our story is about people — the leaders, kaiako, support staff, whānau, and above all, our ākonga, whose energy and achievements continue to define Waihi College.

As part of honouring our past, we have begun developing a comprehensive digital archive. This important mahi includes restoring historic photographs, verifying records, and reconnecting stories across generations. We are also creating new Honours Boards to recognise DUX students, head students, and sporting excellence across the years. Alongside this, the addition of the Matariki constellation in our hall reflects both remembrance and renewal — acknowledging where we have come from, while looking ahead with purpose.

Ngā mihi nui to our wider community for your ongoing support of our students. We are incredibly grateful to the many whānau who support our teams to attend competitions, events, and trips — these opportunities make a real difference to student engagement, confidence, and success.

A special acknowledgement to our student leaders for their outstanding work in organising our St Patrick's Day event, led by Reese Neame. It was a fantastic success, full of energy and school spirit, and we are proud to share that over \$550 was raised. These funds will go towards the restoration of Hollis Bush — our own beautiful piece of native environment here on site. This is a wonderful example of kaiiakitanga in action.

As always, thank you for your continued support, partnership, and commitment to our kura. Together, we are weaving a strong and vibrant future for Waihi College

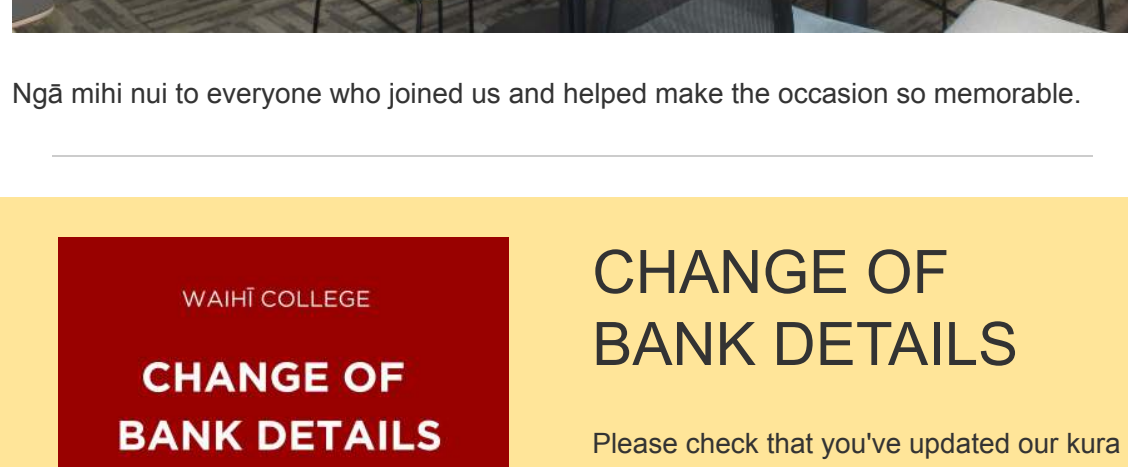
A Morning of Memories and Connection at our Jubilee





Understanding Teen Behaviour: What Science Tells Us

Part 1: Why Teenagers React So Fast

Have you ever wondered why teenagers can go from calm to furious in seconds?

Well, the **teenage brain** is actually undergoing what Kathryn Berkett calls a **"software upgrade"** where connections are remodeled. During this upgrade, the part of the brain (**Green Brain**) that helps humans stay calm and make good choices can be **slower to respond**. However, at the same time, the survival part of the brain (**Red Brain**) is **fast, strong**, and always looking for threats.

When a teenager feels something is unfair, embarrassing, or threatening, to them, the **red brain takes over** and initiates fight, flight, or freeze. As a result, the teenager could **end up reacting very quickly**, resulting in them snapping, yelling, shutting down, or storming off.

- What helps in these moments?
- **Lend them your calm** - slow your voice, lower your volume, and relax your body posture.
 - **Connect with them** - you don't need to agree, but you can show them you see them. *"Hey, I can see this is really frustrating."*
 - **Help them feel safe** - consider how you can reduce the sense of threat. Give them time and space to regulate.

Once their **green brain has come online again**, then you can **work together to reflect and repair**. It is at this point that a consequence could be put in place.



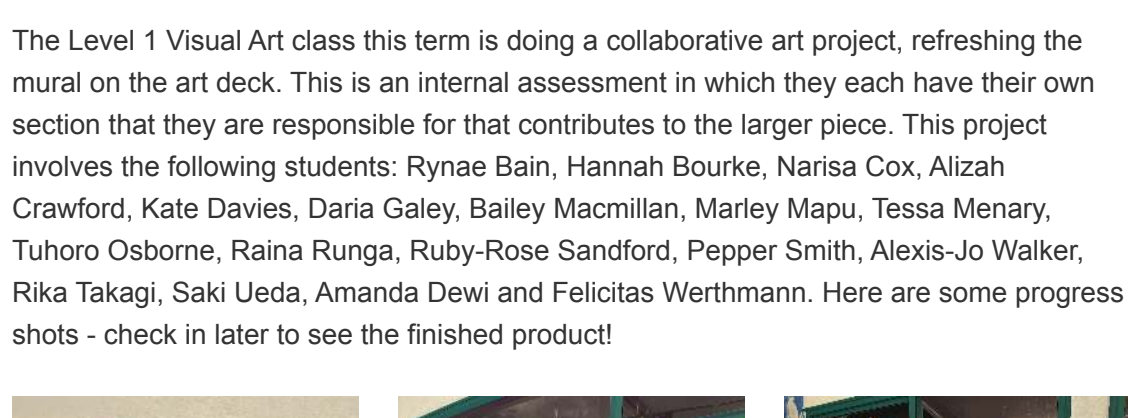

Head Students & Sports Honours Board: Community Support to help preserve our history

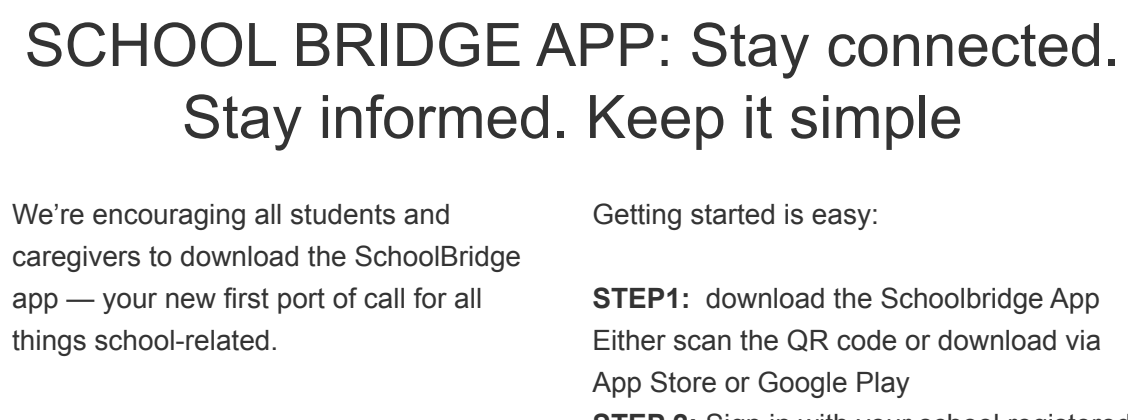

We're encouraging all students and caregivers to download the SchoolBridge app — your new first port of call for all things school-related.


- Mark absences in seconds

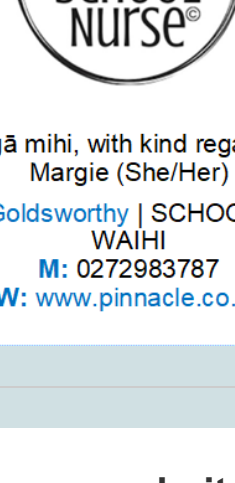
